

CRAFTSMANSHIP IN ZIMBABWE

Issued 22nd January, 2002

(Extracted from Philatelic Bureau Bulletin No 1 of 2002)²



\$12: Knitting and Crocheting are relatively new crafts in Zimbabwe, being introduced in the nineteenth century. Crocheted table cloths and mats are among the most popular sellers creating a valuable source of income. The yarns for these items are produced locally. (*Crocheting is misspelt "Crotcheting" on stamp and in Bulletin*)



\$20: Art and Design play a major role in our lives. Apart from the aesthetic appeal of paintings and graphics, they are found in everyday items such as curtain and dress materials and furnishing fabrics. These all originate from the drawing board.



\$25: Basket Making can be carried out with a minimum number of tools. The only requirements being various grasses, reeds, and in some areas, the bark of the Wattle tree. Vegetable dyes are used to colour the grasses and traditional designs are often woven into the baskets.



\$30: Pottery is one of the oldest crafts in Zimbabwe. Clay pots dating back from many centuries have been discovered at our National Heritage sites, such as Great Zimbabwe and Khami. Today it is part of our tourist attractions.



\$35: Woodcarving is a thriving industry throughout Africa. Fine examples of this may be seen in our tourist centres including Victoria Falls. It is also found at various outlets along the roadside. Numerous timbers are used, the most popular being Kiaat and Mopani.



\$45: Sculpture from Zimbabwe is highly regarded in overseas art circles with its semi-cubist appeal. Different types of stones are used including verdite, serpentine and the more workable soapstone.



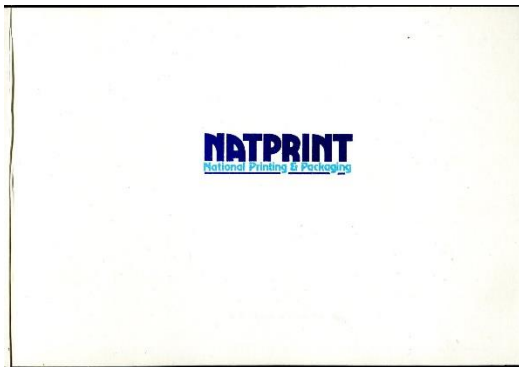

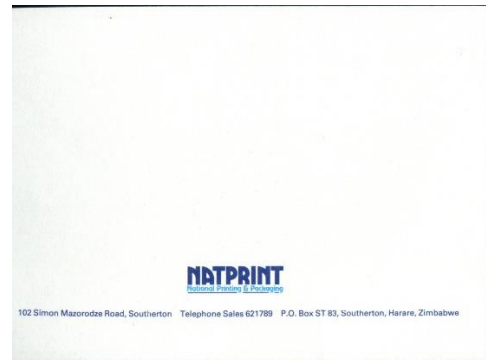
Natprint Proof Presentation Cards

Presentation cards produced by Natprint with imperforate proofs of four of the stamps to be issued. The presentation cards were forwarded to the PTC for approval of the final product.

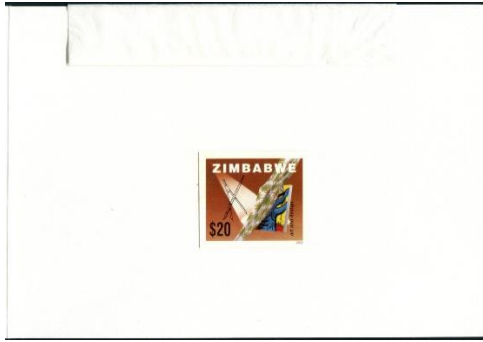

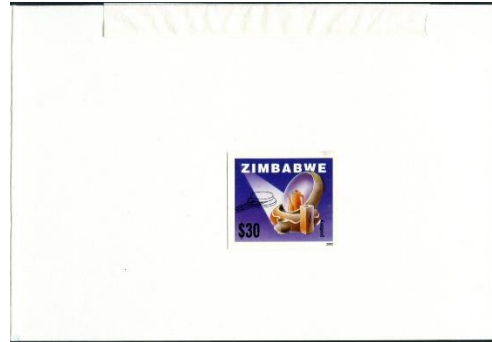
Front cover



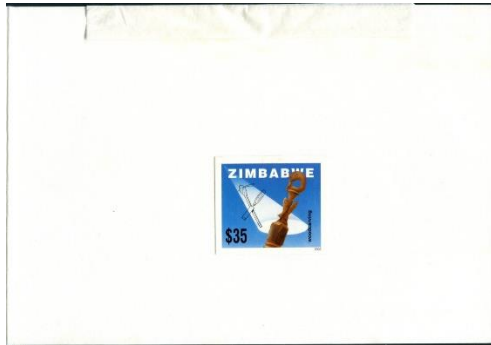
Inside front cover



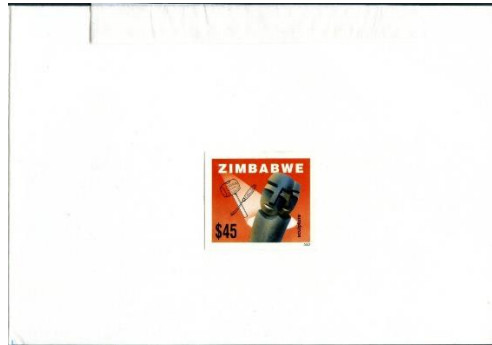
\$20 stamp
