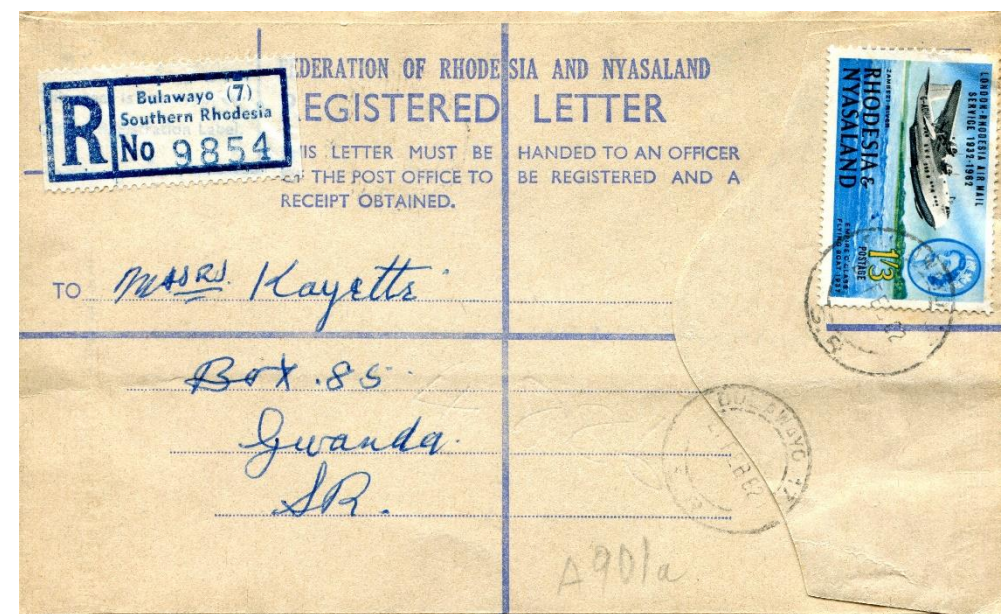
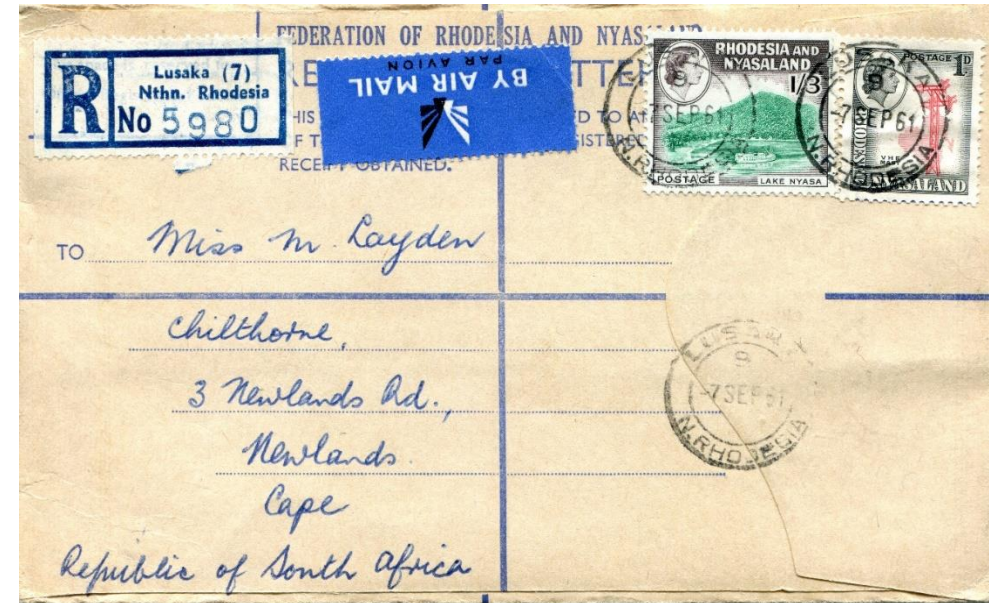
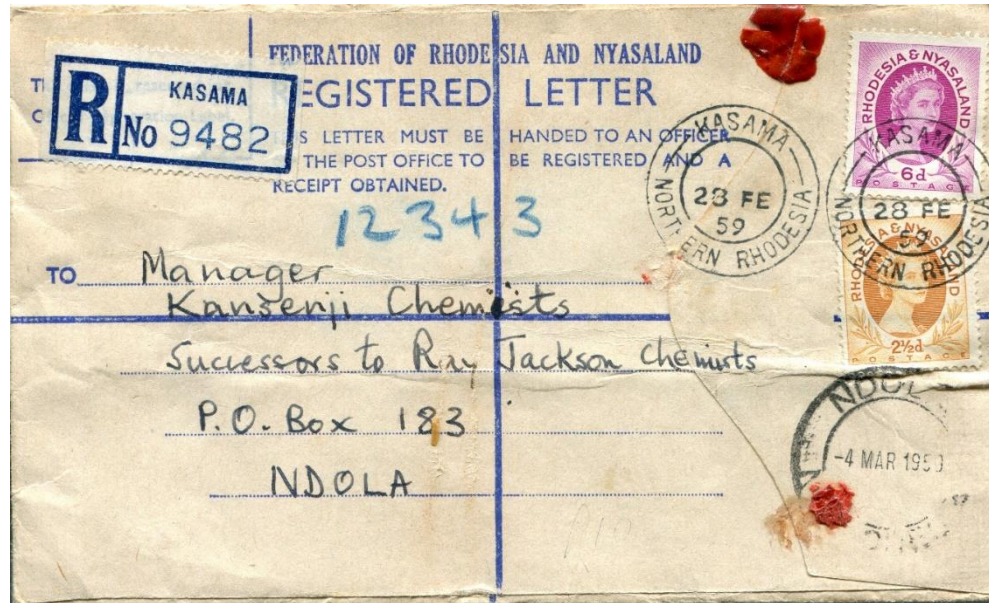
Combination - First Definitive Issue and Commemorate



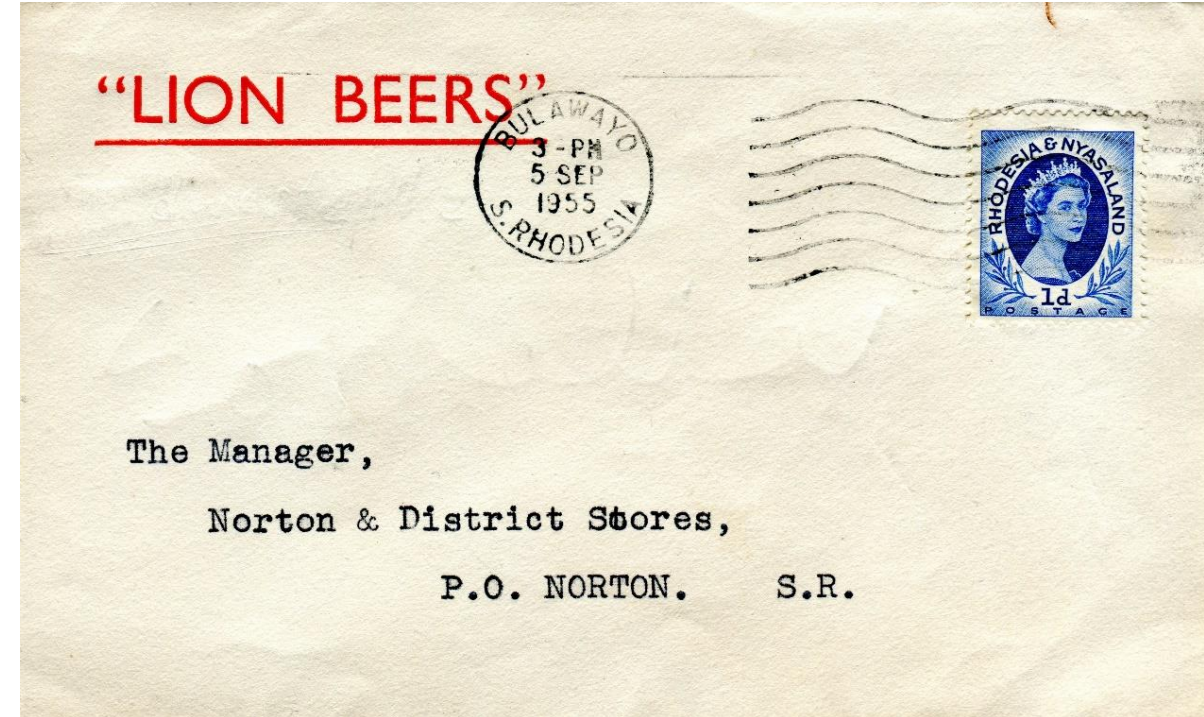

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FACTS ABOUT THE FALLS

On the 16th November, 1855, the Falls were discovered by Dr. David Livingstone, the intrepid missionary explorer, and the first white man to see this amazing masterpiece of Nature.

He named the Falls after Queen Victoria.

Called by the indigenous Africans "Mosi-oa-tunya" (the Smoke that Thunders), the Falls were described by Lord Curzon in his "Tales of Travel" as "The Greatest River Wonder in the World."

To-day, the Victoria Falls are Southern Rhodesia's most spectacular offering to the visitor.
